All music graduate students must pass a keyboard proficiency examination. This exam is designed to ensure the student's ability to use the keyboard as a tool within the framework of professional activities, and the requirements vary according to level and area of music study. This exam may be repeated as many times as necessary to show proficiency. The exam is offered at the end of each term. Students may enroll in secondary piano lessons as preparation for the exam. Early music majors may take the exam on harpsichord. For details, see the Chairperson of the Early Music Department. Exam must be completed by the end of the 5 th semester of enrollment at the latest.
