This exam is designed to ensure the student's ability to use the keyboard as a tool within the framework of professional activities, and the requirements vary according to level and area of music study. This exam may be repeated as many times as necessary to show proficiency. The exam is offered at the end of each term. Students may enroll in secondary piano lessons as preparation for the exam. Exam must be completed by the end of the 5 th semester of enrollment at the latest. Students who do not pass the exam must earn a grade of B or higher in T545 Introductory Analysis of Music Literature . This course may fall anywhere in the student's curriculum. This requirement must be completed before a student may begin qualifying examinations.
