Students must take the exams at the beginning of their first semester of enrollment; they may take them for a second time in their second semester. Exams are ordinarily given in the week before classes begin each semester.) Keyboard Proficiency Examination			
All music graduate students must pass a keyboard proficiency examination. This exam is designed to ensure the student's ability to use the keyboard as a tool within the framework of professional activities, and the requirements vary according to level and area of music study. This exam may be repeated as many times as necessary to show proficiency. The exam is offered at the end of each term. It is the responsibility of the student to consult with the major field department to ascertain the procedures established within that department.
